- General Updates
 - o Completed 14-day smelter outage in February
 - o "One Miami" reorganization
 - Smelter sustainability projects Q4 2024
 - $_{\odot}$ Black stack demolition

- Russel Gulch/Kiser Basin Telegraph Fire/ Flood Recovery Work
 - Freeport-McMoRan Miami actively worked during and after the Telegraph Fire with Gila County, USFS and other stakeholders on recovery plans and new flood models
 - Miami utilized JE Fuller, the same modelers used by Gila County, for continuity in designs and their established reputation
 - The Russell Gulch designs addressed many historic channel issues and prepared for future high-intensity flow events
 - This design complements the Gila County design for upper Russell Gulch for a 100-year storm event
 - Designs involved stakeholders including: ADOT, AWC, Southwest Gas, Century Link, Arizona Eastern, BHP, SRP, CVRC and more
 - Final build creates carrying capacity for a 100-year storm event with four feet of freeboard

- Environmental Update
 - Sulfur Dioxide (SO₂) National Ambient Air Quality Standard (NAAQS) = 75 parts per billion (ppb)
 - Arizona Department of Environmental Quality operates ambient air quality equipment for a variety of federal and state monitoring programs including the Jones Ranch and Miami townsite SO₂ monitors
 - The level of the 1-hour NAAQS for sulfur dioxide (75 ppb) is calculated as the three-year average of the 99th percentile of the annual distribution of daily maximum 1-hour average concentrations
 - Three-year average (2020-2022) for Jones Ranch = 62.97 ppb
 - Three-year average (2020-2022) for Miami Townsite = 49.7 ppb
 - This three-year period achieves clean data objective at the current ambient monitoring stations
 - o ADEQ has a free mobile app available for download for iPhone and Android
 - Provides hourly forecasts and information for areas of concern around the state
 - Available in English and Spanish

 - Application for Minor Permit Revision has been submitted to the Arizona Department of Environmental Quality (ADEQ) for a project that has been communicated for replacement of several old and antiguated pieces of equipment at the smelter including:
 - Replace ISA holding/startup burner
 - Replace electric furnace (ELF)
 - Replace anode casting wheel
 - Gas cleaning (electrostatic precipitator ESP) for converters and ELF
 - ESP dust bin
 - Emergency generator



- Project improves smelter efficiency and minimizes downtime
- Does not exceed emission thresholds for New Source Review pollutants.

• Tailings Storage Facility Update

- As a member of International Council on Mining & Metals (ICMM), Freeport-McMoRan participated in the development of the Global Industry Standard on Tailings Management (Tailings Standard) and are fully committed to conforming to the requirements.
- We have been conducting a rigorous risk assessment process at all our tailings facilities and have changed some facility consequence classifications to align with the criteria of the standard.
- The assessment and consequence classifications will be reflected in our disclosure documents which will be updated and posted on <u>Freeport-McMoRan I FCX</u> in August.
 - Inactive Tailings Safe Closure Miami
 - Risk assessments have confirmed absence of failure modes which may present risk to people or the environment
 - For example:
 - Miami tailings lack saturated tailings with low strength
 - Miami tailings have no risk of overtopping from excess surface water (storage of PMF)
 - Miami tailings have no risk of internal erosion from excess water pressures
 - Inactive Tailings Path to Safe Closure Christmas Mine
 - Two credible failure modes were identified exhibiting material risk under extreme conditions
 - Potential for liquefaction failure under 10,000-year recurrence interval seismic ground motions
 - Embankment overtopping under Probable Maximum Precipitation (PMP) conditions
 - Credible failure modes to be mitigated in 2023 by construction of spillways and buttresses on applicable TSFs (Tailings Storage Facilities) for progression to Safe Closure status (September 2023)

Environmental Update

- July 24, 2023, USEPA published a supplemental to the proposed rulemaking for National Emission Standards for Hazardous Air Pollutants (NESHAP) revisions for Primary Copper Smelters
 - That supplemental rulemaking included a single limit for roofline process fugitive emissions as opposed to the separate limit initially proposed. This provides more flexibility for the smelter to tackle reductions.
 - "Ample Margin of Safety" prescriptive requirements for Aisle Scrubber emissions – Installation of Wet Electrostatic Precipitator or Baghouse. These are technologies that we are providing feedback to EPA regarding their feasibility
 - Mercury limit updated to MACT floor 0.033 lbs./hour in the supplemental rulemaking which differs from the BTF 0.0043 lbs./hour initially proposed in the rulemaking.
 - Additional startup shutdown and malfunction provisions
 - Newly regulated hazardous air pollutants include:
 - Benzene, Polyaromatic hydrocarbons (PAH (Polyaromatic hydrocarbons), Toluene, Naphthalene, HCL, Dioxins, Furans, Chlorine
